Numbers per year:

From 1997-2007, there were over 1,100 deaths from injuries each year in Dallas County. Sixty percent of the deaths were unintentional and 40% were intentional (suicides and homicides). Traffic injuries were the leading cause of injury death accounting for over one-quarter of all deaths (26%) followed by homicide (22%) and suicide (18%).

The Injury Prevention Center of Greater Dallas is housed at Parkland Memorial Hospital. Named one of Modern Healthcare's "25 busiest community hospital emergency department," Parkland Memorial Hospital is consistently honored with the title of one of the Best 100 Hospitals in the U.S. by *US News & World Report*. Parkland is the principle health care facility for the Dallas County Hospital District, and is also the principal teaching hospital for the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center (UTSW). Nearly half of the unfunded patient population in Dallas County is treated at Parkland each year. Parkland's place in history may have been solidified on November 22, 1963, when President John F. Kennedy was brought to the hospital after being shot
